	Chief Dr. Robert Joseph is a Hereditary Chief of the Gwawaenuk First Nation who upholds a life dedicated to
	bridging the differences brought about by intolerance and racism. His insights into the destructive impacts these forces can have on peoples' lives, families and cultures were shaped by his experience with the
	Canadian Indian Residential School system. Chief Joseph shares his journey of reconciliation, including his
	childhood experience at St. Michael's Residential School. He speaks about the important role of reconciliation
	in moving forward through trauma and will address the reconciliation work that is being done across Canada
	to build meaningful relationships among Aboriginal peoples and all Canadians.
